COMMENDATION



In the matter of a Commendation honoring
the Old Fruitvale School: Community History
& Agriculture Project for being selected to receive
the Governor's Historic Preservation Award for 2006.

Whereas, the Governor's Historic Preservation Awards are presented annually under the sponsorship of the State Office of Historic Preservation (OHP) to organizations or public agencies whose contributions demonstrate notable achievements in preserving the heritage of California; and

Whereas, the purpose of the Governor's Historic Preservation Award is to recognize meaningful achievements in historic preservation and to increase public awareness, appreciation, and support for historic preservation throughout the state, and

Whereas, the Old Fruitvale School: Community History & Agriculture Project was one of two projects in Placer County to be nominated by the Historical Advisory Board and selected for this prestigious award in 2006; a rare and special honor; and

Whereas, the Old Fruitvale School was originally built in 1889 on land donated between 1882 and 1889 by Larkin Green Fowler; and

Whereas, it is the last remaining country school in the area still open to the public and hosting public events; and

Whereas, there were generally around twenty children attending school at any given time in the one-room classroom, with students ranging in age and class level up through the eighth grade; and

Whereas, facilities were moderate with no indoor plumbing or running water so plainly marked "Girls" and "Boys" outhouses were used as restrooms and drinking water was pumped by hand from the well outside; and

Whereas, the ethnic population of children at Fruitvale School was primarily British, Danish, Portuguese, Italian, and Japanese; and

Whereas, the role of the school was to educate and integrate the children into their new country; and

Whereas, the schoolhouse functioned as a community school up until it closed in 1946 when the Lincoln School District began busing the country children to Lincoln to attend school; and

Whereas, in the text of the plaque bestowed upon the schoolhouse, the governor wrote, "This 1889 one-room schoolhouse demonstrates how a building preservation project can unite a community to preserve stories and a vanishing lifestyle." and

Whereas, the building was used for community potlucks and functions until the Fruitvale Community bought the building in 1971 for \$50 and with the help of donations and volunteers, restored the building to preserve its history. The school is currently used for special events and education programs including a "Living History" program and a unique agricultural program called "Farmer to Farmer" sponsoring farmers from Bulgaria invited to the area on an International Exchange program to visit local ranches, farms and agricultural organizations.

Now Therefore Let It Be Know That, on this 19th day of December, 2006 the Placer County Board of Supervisors takes great pleasure in honoring the Old Fruitvale School: Community History & Agriculture Project for being selected to receive the Governor's Historic Preservation Award for 2006 and presents this Commendation with great pride to Lyndell Grey on behalf of the Old Fruitvale School: Community History & Agriculture Project.
