SUBJECT: Contract Amendment with Yolo Community Care Continuum

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**ACTION REQUESTED**

Approve an amendment with Yolo Community Care Continuum (YCCC) for the provision of Crisis Residential Services to increase the contract by \$238,095 and extend the term through August 31, 2021, for a maximum amount not to exceed \$3,055,241 for the entire period of July 1, 2019 through August 31, 2021 and authorize the Director of Health and Human Services to sign the amendment with Risk Management and County Counsel concurrence, and to sign subsequent amendments not to exceed \$100,000, consistent with the subject matter and scope of work with Risk Management and County Counsel concurrence.

**BACKGROUND**

The Short-Term Crisis Residential Treatment Program for adult mental health consumers is a critical part of a continuum of mandated mental health services provided to Placer County residents. YCCC has been providing crisis residential services to County residents at the Roseville Cirby Hills site since the award of RFP 10425 on June 16, 2015. Crisis residential services provide an alternative to expensive and more restrictive inpatient hospitalization for those in crisis requiring 24-hour observation and treatment. These services are cost-effective, voluntary, recovery-focused and outcome driven. Many of the clients admitted also experience significant challenges with substance abuse and homelessness in addition to their mental disorder. This short-term treatment option offers assistance and hope to address each of these challenges towards individual recovery. Each resident receives medication support services, case management, counseling and safe and appropriate discharge planning back into the community upon stabilization.

Placer County and YCCC have agreed to change the cost and payment structure of its Crisis Residential contracts moving forward. Instead of these contracts being "cost" reimbursement" contracts, we are changing to a daily rate per guest reimbursement structure beginning in 2021. We believe this change in structure will be simpler and an improvement in how services are rendered. Because of this significant change in structure, an additional two months was needed on the existing contract before the renewal contract goes into place, estimated September 1, 2021. This 14 bed capacity program meets the on-going service demand and allows the County to divert more individuals away from more expensive and restrictive services at the County Inpatient Psychiatric Health Facility (PHF) or to private psychiatric hospitalization.

**FISCAL IMPACT**

The agreement includes funds that were in the Department's FY 2019-20 and FY 2020-21 Budgets. Additionally, funds for FY 2021-22 are included in the Department's FY 2021-22 Budget and will consist of \$121,428 (51%) in Federal and State Funds and 116,667 (49%) in County General Funds.

The amendment is on file with the Clerk of the Board for review.
