**SUBJECT:** Agreement with Yolo Community Care Continuum to operate a Short-Term Crisis Residential Treatment Program

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**ACTION REQUESTED**

1. Approve an agreement with Yolo Community Care Continuum (YCCC) from September 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022 for the provision of Crisis Residential Services for a total contract amount not to exceed \$1,494,675 and authorize the Director of Health and Human Services to sign the agreement with Risk Management and County Counsel concurrence, and to sign subsequent amendments not to exceed \$100,000, consistent with the subject matter and scope of work with Risk Management and County Counsel concurrence.
2. Approve the associated Lease Agreement between the County and Yolo Community Care Continuum (YCCC) from September 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022, with the option to extend annually and authorize the Director of Facilities Management, or designee, to execute the Lease Agreement with Risk Management and County Counsel concurrence.

**BACKGROUND**

This short-term 14-bed Crisis Residential Treatment Program for adult mental health consumers is a critical part of a continuum of mandated mental health services provided to Placer County residents. YCCC has been providing crisis residential services to County residents at the Roseville Cirby Hills site since the award of RFP 10425 on June 16, 2015. Crisis residential services provide an alternative to expensive and more restrictive inpatient hospitalization for those in crisis requiring 24-hour observation and treatment. These services are cost-effective, voluntary, recovery-focused and outcome driven. Many of the clients admitted also experience significant challenges with substance abuse and homelessness in addition to their mental disorder. This short-term treatment option offers assistance and hope to address each of these challenges towards individual recovery. Each resident receives medication support services, case management, counseling, and safe and appropriate discharge planning back into the community upon stabilization. During FY 2020-21, there were 220 admissions accounting for 2,376 client bed days with an average length of stay of 6.9 days. Of the 220 admissions, only 7 (.03%) required a higher level of care.

Placer County and YCCC agreed to change the cost and payment structure of its Crisis Residential contracts moving forward. Instead of these contracts being "cost" reimbursement" contracts, we are changing to a daily rate per resident reimbursement structure. Because of this significant change in structure, the previous agreement has been extended through August 31,

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2021 and the new agreement will begin September 1, 2021. This change in structure will be simpler and an improvement in how services are rendered. This 14-bed capacity program meets the on-going service demand and allows the County to divert more individuals away from more expensive and restrictive services at the County Inpatient Psychiatric Health Facility (PHF) or to private psychiatric hospitalization.

**FISCAL IMPACT**

Funding for this agreement consists of \$762,284 (51%) in State/Federal funding and \$732,391 (49%) in County General Funds. Funding is included in the Departments FY 2021-22 Budget.
